Established in 1989, WIFTV is a member-based organization, committed to creating an equitable screen-based industry for women and gender diverse people. By addressing systemic barriers, we believe we are also working towards more inclusive, representative media.

We approach our mission by:

- Advocating and organizing for equity in funding, employment, and promotional opportunities for all women and gender diverse people in the film and TV industry
- Providing low-barrier, accessible programming, including mentorship and educational events to increase women and gender diverse participation in screen based media
- Producing the annual Vancouver International Women in Film Festival that champions women and gender diverse creators.

We recognize that our current name unintentionally excludes gender diverse people who aren't women. We are in the process of a name change to address this.

Job Details

Job Title: VIWFF Shorts Programmer

Term Duration: Nov 30, 2022 (or ASAP) through to March 15, 2023 (approx)

Job Location: Remote work. Some in person meetings and event attendance will be required.

Salary/Wage: \$1,500 honorarium, estimated 20 hours a month, 60 hours total.

The Short Film Programmer is a newly created role responsible for leading the curation of the 2023 VIWFF Shorts Program.

Running March 7-11, 2023, VIWFF's 18th edition will showcase approximately 20-30 short films by Indigenous, Canadian, and International filmmakers.

The Shorts Programmer will assess submitted and solicited films of various genres, work with the selection committee and collaborate with the Festival Programming Lead to curate and present 4-5 shorts programs, including a BC Shorts Program, at the 2023 festival. The Shorts programmer will also facilitate Q&As with the attending filmmakers during the festival. The shorts programmer will be required to work flexible hours around the needs of the Vancouver International Women in Film Festival. The festival will be a hybrid of online and in person events.

- Experience with film programming and presentation for film festivals or arts organizations; and the ability to critically assess a large quantity of films;
- Commitment to the principles of decolonisation, justice, equity, diversity, inclusion and accessibility in screen-based industries;
- Experience or understanding of communities that are marginalized or that face structural discrimination including those identifying as Indigenous, people of colour, members of non-dominant ethnic, religious, linguistic and/or cultural groups, women, (im)migrants/newcomers, people with (dis)abilities, and LGBTQ2S+ people;
- Exceptional knowledge of contemporary Indigenous and Canadian cinema;
- Outstanding writing, communication, and interpersonal skills;
- Ability to maintain confidentiality and discretion;
- Strong decision-making and facilitation skills;
- Organizational skills and the ability to work within deadlines.

Key Responsibilities:

- Lead the evaluation and consideration of submitted Indigenous, Canadian, and International short films;
- Curate 4-5 shorts programs that will be presented at the festival;
- Contribute program notes for selected films and other copywriting that will appear on VWIFF's website, as well as in other publicity and marketing materials;
- Shared with the programming team, introduce films and filmmakers during the festival and facilitate post-screening Q&As;
- Represent the mission and values of VWIFF to the film community;
- Support publicity, marketing, and outreach efforts that expand and diversify VWIFF's audience;
